A PROCLAMATION

TO OUR FAITHFUL MEMBERS elected to serve in the Legislative Assembly by our province of Saskatchewan and to every one of you GREETING:

WHEREAS it is expedient for causes and considerations to convene the First Session of the Twenty-eighth Legislative Assembly of our province of Saskatchewan.

WE DO WILL that you and each of you and all others in this behalf interested on TUESDAY the SEVENTEENTH day of MAY, 2016, at 10:00 a.m. at our city of Regina, personally be and appear for the DESPATCH OF BUSINESS, there to take into consideration the state and welfare of our said province of Saskatchewan and thereby to do as may seem necessary, HEREIN FAIL NOT.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF we have caused the Great Seal of our province of Saskatchewan to be hereunto affixed.

WITNESS: Our right trusty and well beloved Honourable Vaughn Solomon Schofield, Lieutenant Governor of our province of Saskatchewan.

I am commanded by Her Honour, the Lieutenant Governor, to inform you that she does not see fit to declare the causes of the summoning of the present legislature until later today, when the Legislative Assembly shall have elected a Speaker according to law.

Her Honour the Lieutenant Governor then retired from the Chamber.

ELECTION OF SPEAKER

Pursuant to the provisions of rules 41, 42, and 43 inclusive, the Assembly proceeded to the election of a Speaker.

The Clerk informed the Assembly that the following members declared their intention to stand as candidates for election to the Office of Speaker, pursuant to rule 43(1):

Members then proceeded to cast their ballots.

The Clerk, being satisfied that the voting procedure had been completed, proceeded with the counting of the ballots.

The Assembly recessed from 10:20 a.m. to 10:40 a.m. during the counting of the ballots.

Pursuant to rule 43(9), the Clerk informed the Assembly that a second ballot would be necessary and announced the list of candidates as follows:

Mr. Corey Tochor, Member for the constituency of Saskatoon Eastview

Members then proceeded to cast their ballots.

The Clerk, being satisfied that the voting procedure had been completed, proceeded with the counting of the ballots.

The Assembly recessed from 10:54 a.m. to 11:10 a.m. during the counting of the second ballots.

The Clerk informed the Assembly that Mr. Tochor, Member for the constituency of Saskatoon Eastview, had been elected to the Office of the Speaker.

The Clerk having declared Mr. Tochor elected, he was escorted to the Chair where, standing on the dais, he addressed the Assembly as follows:

I wish to express my grateful thanks and humble acknowledgement of the high honour the Assembly has conferred on me. While I leave the floor of this Assembly to take the Speaker's Chair, I leave behind all political partisan biases in order that I may discharge with impartiality to all and to the best of my ability the various and important duties pertaining to the high office of Speaker.

It will be my aim and duty to uphold the principles and traditions of the Assembly and secure for each member the right to express his or her opinions within the limits necessary to preserve decorum; to recognize the rights and privileges of the honourable members, the political groups, and the Assembly itself; to facilitate the transaction of the public business in an orderly manner; and above all, to seek to be fair and impartial in the decisions you entrust to me.

Thereupon, the Speaker took the Chair and the mace was laid on the Table.

The Assembly recessed from 11:20 a.m. until 2:00 p.m.

2:03 p.m.

Her Honour the Lieutenant Governor re-entered the Chamber and took her seat upon the Throne.

SPEECH FROM THE THRONE

Her Honour the Lieutenant Governor then opened the session with the following speech:

Mr. Speaker, Members of the Legislative Assembly, honoured guests, people of Saskatchewan. Welcome to the opening of first session of the twenty-eighth Saskatchewan legislature.

Just a few weeks ago, the people of Saskatchewan chose the women and men who will have the tremendous honour and responsibility of serving in this Assembly.

My government wants to begin the first session of this new Legislative Assembly by saying thank you. Thank you to all of the candidates who stood for election on April 4. Our vibrant democracy is well-served by an active debate and contest of ideas between strong candidates from all parties. Thank you to the thousands of volunteers who worked on campaigns throughout the province—giving of their time and effort to make Saskatchewan a better place. Thank you to all the Elections Saskatchewan officials who administered a fair and impartial election process. But most of all, thank you to the people of

Saskatchewan who took the time to consider all the options and make their choice. The 61 members of this new Legislative Assembly are grateful for and humbled by the trust you have placed in them and will work hard every day to be deserving of that trust.

My government also wants to thank the people of Saskatchewan for their heartfelt responses to the horrific events in La Loche and in Fort McMurray. Saskatchewan will continue to stand with those communities as they recover and heal from these tragedies.

KEEPING SASKATCHEWAN STRONG

On April 4, my government was re-elected based on a campaign that made few specific promises, but instead made one simple yet significant commitment—to keep Saskatchewan strong.

During this session, my government will keep its promises and it will honour its commitment to keep Saskatchewan strong in three key areas:

- My government will keep our economy strong;
- It will keep the province's finances strong; and
- It will keep Saskatchewan's position in Canada strong by always standing up for Saskatchewan's interests.

KEEPING PROMISES

During this session, my government will move forward on the campaign commitments it made to keep Saskatchewan strong and provide a better quality of life for all Saskatchewan people. Over the past eight years, my government has made record investments in highways and infrastructure, repairing and rebuilding over 10,000 kilometres of Saskatchewan roads. Still, there is more work to be done and more highways to be fixed.

Starting this year and over the next three years, my government will fix more highways through a \$70 million surge in highway repair and maintenance. This is part of a new highways 2020 plan to invest \$2.7 billion in highways and transportation capital over the next four years. In addition to making our highways safer for everyone, this important investment in highways will create economic activity and jobs in the short term and will strengthen our ability to move Saskatchewan goods to market in the long term.

My government will also continue to move forward on many other important infrastructure projects underway throughout the province—schools, hospitals, long-term care facilities, the Regina bypass—using both traditional funding models and public-private partnerships or P3s to ensure Saskatchewan residents receive the best possible value for their tax dollars.

These important infrastructure investments by ministries and Crowns will total \$3.6 billion this year—a record investment that will help meet the needs of a growing province, facilitate our growth plan and create jobs and opportunity that will keep Saskatchewan strong.

KEEPING OUR ECONOMY STRONG

Saskatchewan has now enjoyed a decade of growth. From January 1, 2006 to January 1, 2016, Saskatchewan grew by 150,000 people or 15 per cent—the strongest sustained period of growth since the earliest days of our province. This is a dramatic turnaround from the previous decade of decline.

From January 1, 1996 to January 1, 2006, Saskatchewan's population dropped by nearly 24,000 people, as thousands left our province to pursue opportunities elsewhere. My government is committed to ensuring Saskatchewan never returns to those days of decline and that this new era of growth continues. To that end, my government will consult with industry on the establishment of a new growth tax incentive. It will be the first innovation tax rate of its kind established in North America. This new "patent box" tax incentive is designed to create jobs and investment through an advantageous tax rate for the commercialization of patents and intellectual property right here in our province.

My government is also committed to helping small, home-based food businesses grow in Saskatchewan. To that end, it will allow home-based food producers to sell high-quality, low-risk foods, prepared in the home, directly to consumers and retailers.

These new initiatives build on many steps my government has already taken to encourage economic growth and diversification, including:

- Lowering taxes for businesses, individuals, families, homeowners, and farmers;
- Reducing the burden of unnecessary regulation and red tape;
- Working with Saskatchewan exporters to open and expand new markets for Saskatchewan products around the world;
- Actively promoting Saskatchewan's tourism industry; and
- Investing in skills training to match Saskatchewan's labour market needs, with a specific emphasis on First Nations and Métis education and skills training.

Saskatchewan farmers, ranchers and agribusinesses are also keeping our economy strong. In 2015, Saskatchewan's agri-food exports reached nearly \$15.3 billion, surpassing my government's Growth Plan target of \$15 billion in exports by 2020.

Over the past few years, the people and economies of Saskatchewan, Alberta, and British Columbia have benefitted from our provinces working closely together to lower interprovincial trade barriers and harmonize regulations through the New West Partnership. My government congratulates the newly-elected government of Manitoba and looks forward to working with them on many important issues, including their campaign commitment to join the New West Partnership. Despite the significant challenges facing our resource sector, Saskatchewan's strong and diversified economy continues to attract new investment.

In just the last few weeks, a number of companies have announced major new investments and expansions in Saskatchewan:

- Edgewood Forest Products at Carrot River held its grand opening of a \$25 million saw mill expansion expected to employ 50 people;
- Crescent Point Energy announced it will spend about \$800 million of its projected \$950 million capital budget for 2016 in Saskatchewan;
- Husky Energy will invest more than \$1 billion related to heavy oil thermal projects creating approximately 90 full-time jobs and 500 construction jobs;
- Weil Group is building a \$10 million helium facility near Mankota that will supply refined, industrial-grade helium to markets throughout North America;
- RII North America has a \$50 million enhanced oil recovery operation near Lloydminster that will raise average recovery rates from 5 to 45 per cent in some reservoirs;
- The K + S Legacy Mine, a \$4.1 billion project and the first new potash mine in Saskatchewan in more than 40 years, is expected to begin production in late 2016;
- BHP Billiton has invested \$20 million to establish a Carbon Capture and Storage Knowledge Centre in Saskatchewan with SaskPower; and
- Revera is building a \$75 million, 216 suite retirement community in Regina, creating 300 jobs during construction and 150 permanent jobs when completed.

These are just a few of the companies that continue to demonstrate their ongoing confidence in Saskatchewan's future by investing in new projects and creating new jobs. My government thanks all of them for helping to keep Saskatchewan strong. These kinds of new opportunities have led to Saskatchewan's strong population growth and more young people choosing to stay in Saskatchewan after graduation. In 2008, my government introduced the most aggressive youth retention program in Canada. Since then, 58,000 young people have benefitted from the Graduate Retention Program (GRP).

My government is now improving the Graduate Retention Program to allow recipients to use up to \$10,000 of their GRP benefits toward the down payment on their first home in Saskatchewan. In this session, my government will also introduce a legislative amendment to remove the Saskatchewan Liquor and Gaming Authority from *The Crown Corporations Public Ownership Act*. This change is part of a campaign commitment to convert 40 government-owned liquor stores to private stores, add 12 new private liquor stores and create a level playing field for liquor retailers in order to provide more choice, more convenience and more competitive pricing for Saskatchewan consumers.

A BETTER QUALITY OF LIFE

My government believes that a strong economy ensures a better quality of life for all Saskatchewan people. Over the past eight years, a growing economy has enabled my government to make important improvements to health care—hiring more doctors and nurses, building new hospitals and long-term care homes and reducing surgical wait lists to the point that in 2015, Saskatchewan had the shortest wait times in Canada.

Again, this is a complete reversal of the previous decade which saw Saskatchewan losing doctors and nurses, hospitals and long-term care facilities closing, and the longest surgical wait times in Canada. The dramatic turnaround from the longest to the shortest surgical wait times has been due in part to my government's decision to allow private surgeries within the publicly-funded system.

This was recently recognized in a report by former Finance Minister Janice MacKinnon who said: "By focusing reforms on practical solutions rather than ideological preferences, the Government of Saskatchewan has markedly reduced wait times in a fairly short period of time." Patients in Saskatchewan are now able to pay privately for MRI scans using the "two for one" model the Saskatchewan Roughriders have used for many years. For every scan paid for privately, the clinic must provide one scan at no charge to a patient on the public list, thereby reducing the public wait list. My government will expand this innovative approach to include CT scans.

In May 2014, my government launched an innovative remote presence technology pilot project to deliver better health care to Pelican Narrows in northern Saskatchewan. The project uses advanced robotic telemedicine to enable health care providers to connect with patients remotely and perform real-time assessment, diagnosis and patient management. My government will fulfill its commitment to provide an additional \$500,000 a year to expand this innovative technology to other remote communities.

We have all seen stories of families who suffered a tragic loss of a loved one, but through that loss, the lives of others were saved because the person who died had made the choice to become an organ donor. Sadly, there are still far too many Saskatchewan people waiting for an organ transplant that will save their lives, and some will not receive that call in time. Unfortunately, Canada's rates of organ donation are quite low compared to many European countries and the United States.

During this session, my government will ask the Standing Committee on Human Services to examine this issue, including looking at best practices in other countries with a higher rate of organ donation. The

committee will make recommendations on how to increase the organ donation rate in Saskatchewan. My government will also introduce changes to *The Saskatchewan Employment Act* to benefit those caring for a family member in the final stages of life, ensuring they will be eligible for a full 28 weeks of leave per year.

My government will move forward on its campaign commitment to reduce health region administration by \$7.5 million a year and re-direct that savings toward improving seniors' care by hiring more registered nurses, licensed practical nurses, and continuing care aides in long-term care facilities.

During this session, my government will also fulfill its commitment to help seniors remain in their own homes longer by allowing seniors with household incomes under \$70,000 to defer the education portion of their property taxes, beginning in 2017. My government is committed to providing more green energy in Saskatchewan. That is why it will extend the current net metering program for residential and commercial customers for another two years. It is also why my government has forged a new partnership with the First Nations Power Authority. That new partnership will see First Nations developing 40 megawatts of clean energy generated from solar power and flare gas.

This plan will ensure that First Nations in our province are active participants in the economic benefits associated with the construction of clean energy. It is a plan that will assist Saskatchewan in moving toward its target of having 50 per cent of electrical power needs generated by renewable sources by 2030.

KEEPING OUR FINANCES STRONG

Despite the challenges in our resource sector, Saskatchewan's finances remain strong. Our budget deficit remains much smaller and more manageable than our neighboring provinces. Our debt-to-GDP ratio is the second lowest in Canada and we continue to enjoy a triple-A credit rating. In two weeks, my government will present a budget that will keep Saskatchewan strong by keeping our provincial finances strong and by ensuring that the budget returns to balance by 2017.

The upcoming budget will also mark the beginning of a government-wide exercise of transformational change to ensure the sustainability of high quality public services delivered in the most effective, efficient way possible.

STANDING UP FOR SASKATCHEWAN

My government believes in a strong Saskatchewan within a strong and united Canada. But it is troubling that today, there are some in this country who, given the opportunity, would shut down major parts of Saskatchewan's economy and put thousands of hard-working Saskatchewan people out of work, all in the name of some misguided dogma that has no basis in reality. There are those who are not comfortable with and even oppose much of what we produce in Saskatchewan and how we produce it—oil and gas, coal and uranium, livestock and grains.

They would prefer that those sectors did not exist and that the thousands of jobs in those sectors did not exist. They look at those jobs like they are somehow harming the country and the world. To those people, my government has a message. You are wrong. You could not be more wrong. Saskatchewan feeds Canada and the world. Saskatchewan supplies energy to Canada and to the world. What we do here makes Canada a better place. What we do here makes the world a better place. My government will take every occasion to stand up for this province, to defend those vital sectors and to stand up for every one of those jobs.

CONCLUSION

For many years, many different leaders have used a metaphor taken from the Sermon on the Mount in Matthew 5:14—the metaphor of the shining city on a hill. Those who have invoked this imagery, from John Winthrop to John F. Kennedy to Ronald Reagan, have used it to say that those of us who have been blessed by providence have the responsibility to serve as a beacon of hope, welcoming all to our shining city.

Now of course, this is Saskatchewan. It's hard to find a city on a hill. But today we have the freshly clad copper dome of this Legislature to serve as our symbol of that shining city. Let it be a reminder to all of us that we are blessed to live in the best province in the best country in the world. And for those of us who are particularly blessed with the honour of serving under this beautiful, shining dome, let it serve as a reminder that to whom much is given, much is expected.

Let our new shining dome remind us of where we have been, where we are headed and that Saskatchewan should always be a beacon of hope whose best days are still ahead. I now leave you to the business of the session, knowing that you will favourably discharge your duties and responsibilities. May Divine Providence continue to bless our province and guide this Assembly in all of its deliberations.

God bless Saskatchewan. God bless Canada. And God save the Queen.

**STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Ruling—Budget leak—Prima Facie case established)**

Yesterday, June 1, 2016, the Government House Leader (Hon. Mr. Cheveldayoff) raised a question of privilege in accordance with rule 12. The Government House Leader argued that the Member for Saskatoon Nutana (Ms. Sproule) released confidential, embargoed information about the provincial budget before it was tabled in the Assembly, and that this constitutes a violation of parliamentary convention and a contempt of the Assembly.

Prior to receiving the notice of privilege, the Opposition House Leader (Mr. McCall), the Leader of the Opposition (Mr. Wotherspoon), and finally the Member for Saskatoon Nutana acknowledged in the Assembly that the breach of the embargoed information had taken place. All three members apologized to the Assembly for violating the conditions of the lock-up. With admission of the members that the leak had occurred, there is no dispute over the facts of the matter.

As the Government House Leader points out, and I think all members will acknowledge, it is a long standing parliamentary convention that the contents of the budget should be kept secret until the Minister of Finance tables the budget in the Assembly. The use of lock-ups have been a part of the budget process in this province and elsewhere for many decades. These lock-ups are entirely at the government's discretion but when they do take place it is expected that opposition members are permitted access to the technical briefs. In the past, when access has been denied, the Speaker has permitted privilege cases to proceed. It is appropriate then, if it is a serious matter when a member is denied access to the briefs, that a breach of the embargo conditions by a member should be treated with equal seriousness.

I have reviewed the precedents of this Assembly and elsewhere.

In 1982, a question of privilege was raised in this Assembly concerning the leak of budget information to the media prior to the presentation of the budget in the Chamber. In that case there was uncertainty about the source of the leak, which is a different circumstance than the present case. Under the conventions of the day, Speaker Brockelbank ruled there was no prima facie case of breach of privilege. Speaker Brockelbank's decision was based on the historical standards for such matters, which are outlined at page 894 of *The House of Commons Procedure and Practice, Second Edition, 2009*.

This convention is somewhat out of step with more recent rulings on the premature release of information on bills. On April 19 of this year, the Speaker of the House of Commons in Ottawa ruled on a contempt case in which the contents of Bill C-14 were provided to the media before the bill was introduced in the House. Speaker Regan stated that the House's right of first access to legislative information was not respected and the bill should have been brought to the House first and not prematurely released to the public domain. In this case the Speaker concluded that the incident constituted a prima facie case of privilege. This ruling was based on a similar House of Commons ruling of 2001.

It is apparent that there are conflicting precedents on these types of cases and parliamentary practice is evolving, just as it did when Speaker Milliken departed from previous House of Commons rulings in 2001 and found a prima facie case of contempt when opposition members were denied embargoed information provided to the media. That case became the basis for a similar ruling by Speaker Kowalsky in this Assembly on April 11, 2005. It is my point of view that the leak of embargoed budget information is at least the equivalent of denying access to members to a lock up. If one should be thought of as contemptuous then so should the other. It is also my point of view that the leak of budget information is as significant, or possibly even more significant, than the leak of a bill before it is tabled in the Assembly.

I noted that the Member for Saskatoon Nutana and others of her caucus apologized for the leak of information. It is true that in past instances an apology has ended the matter. In this case I don't believe the apology is sufficient enough reason to end this case. The House of Commons in Ottawa has similar conventions and in many cases apologies do end the case. In other circumstances the apology is not sufficient. In the case of Bill C-14, Speaker Regan acknowledged the unequivocal apology of the Government Whip for the leak but allowed the case to proceed by finding a prima facie question of privilege.

The Regan ruling last month established a much higher standard of conduct for members and respect for the parliamentary institution. As in 2005, when Speaker Kowalsky was faced with a similarly difficult decision, I believe it would be appropriate for the Assembly to consider the direction that it wishes to take on this matter. Therefore I find a prima facie case of breach of privilege and invite the Government House Leader to move his motion.

That this matter be referred to the Standing Committee on Privileges for a full investigation and a report with a remedy to be tabled in the Legislative Assembly.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Unparliamentary Language)

I am prepared to rule on the point of order that was raised by the Government House Leader immediately after Question Period, on Thursday, October 20, 2016. The Government House Leader (Hon. Mr. Merriman) alleged that the Leader of the Opposition had said that the Premier cannot be trusted.

In response to the point of order, the Opposition House Leader (Mr. McCall) countered that the Leader of the Opposition used language that was within the accepted rules and usage of this Assembly.

I have reviewed Hansard and on page 771 the Leader of the Opposition stated, and I quote, “And we should be able to trust, we should be able to trust what the Premier is saying about the finances.”

Members are well aware that it is not permissible to accuse or suggest that another member was not being truthful. This practice is codified in our rule 51(f), in paragraph 484(3) of *Beauchesne’s Parliamentary Rules and Forms*, 6th Edition and on page 618 of *The House of Commons Procedure and Practice*, 2nd Edition, 2009.

In this Assembly, many Speakers have ruled that the integrity of members should not be questioned and the imputations of intentional falsehoods are not permissible. While it is not unparliamentary to criticize statements made by members as being contrary to the facts, the integrity or motives of members whether individually or collectively, should not be questioned directly or indirectly.

After reviewing Hansard, I find that the Leader of the Opposition’s comments were not directed specifically at the Premier. Rather, they were directed at the accuracy of the information provided by the Premier relating to the finances of the province. As outlined by Speaker Toth in his ruling of March 29, 2010, and I quote, “Members understanding of the facts often differ and that is why we have debate in this Chamber”. For this reason I find the point of order not well taken.

In closing, I want to caution all members to avoid words and phrases that could be misconstrued as a reflection on another member’s personal character.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Unparliamentary Language)

Members, I would like to make a ruling on a point of order raised yesterday by the Opposition House Leader (Mr. McCall) concerning a statement made by the Minister of Energy and Resources (Hon. Mr. Duncan) in an exchange with the Member for Saskatoon Nutana, during Question Period on October 26, 2016.

The Opposition House Leader stated that the Minister had contravened rule 51(f) by using the phrase “false information provided by the Member for Saskatoon Nutana” and suggested the Minister withdraw the comment and apologize. The Government House Leader (Hon. Mr. Merriman) responded that the Minister had not disregarded the rule and requested that I review the Minister’s comments.

I have reviewed the Hansard and I am prepared to rule on the matter. The Minister said, and I quote from page 909 of *Hansard*, “I am not sure where to start in my response to all the false information that was provided by the member from Nutana.”

Beauchesne’s Parliamentary Rules and Forms, 6th Edition, paragraph 494, says: “It is not unparliamentary temperately to criticize statements made by members as being contrary to the facts; but no imputation of intentional falsehood is permissible. On rare occasions this may result in the House having to accept two contradictory accounts of the same incident.” This was supported by Speaker Kowalsky on March 8, 2007, when he stated that the test is whether the words imply direct intent to falsify. I find that the Minister’s statement did not imply that the member was intentionally falsifying information but that the information stated by the member was in his opinion, false. Therefore, I find the point of order not well taken.

**STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Unparliamentary Language)**

On the first point of order that was raised by the Government House Leader (Hon. Mr. Merriman) he alleged that the Member from Saskatoon Nutana (Ms. Sproule) used the phrase “making stuff up.” In response, the Opposition House Leader (Mr. McCall) indicated that there is no list of words or phrases that are not able to be said, rather a question around what motive is imputed with the phrase itself.

I have reviewed *Hansard* and on page 1124 the Member from Saskatoon Nutana stated, “they’re making it up as they go along.” Language similar to this has been found to be unparliamentary on numerous occasions in recent years.

This comment is part of what I think has been a steady erosion of decorum in recent days because of inflammatory and provocative comments hurled across the floor, both on and off the record. I was asked to review the record and in doing so I am sorry to say I found many instances of language that are of concern. On Thursday, I found that members have accused each other of misrepresentations and mischaracterizations. Members have come very close to questioning the truthfulness or forthrightness of each other. On the very point the Government House Leader raised with respect to the language of the Member for Saskatoon Nutana in Question Period, a government member accused an opposition member of “they’re making this up in their pretended mind” during the Seventy-five minute debate.

Members, this has to stop. I am asking all members to tone it down. The Member for Saskatoon Nutana isn’t the only member who has contributed to the erosion in decorum, so on this occasion, I will not single her out to withdraw and apologize.

I would strongly urge members to choose their words wisely as it is possible to effectively debate opposing positions, criticize statements made by members as being contrary to the facts, or offer alternative versions of the facts. This can be done without calling into question the integrity of other members.

Further, I also want to bring to the attention of all members that in recent days members are not following the rules of debate as outlined in rule 51(c) which states that members should be referred to by title, position, or constituency name. As an example, on Thursday, members referred to other members as “scandal plagued former Minister,” “the junior minister from Meadow Lake,” and “the old grim reaper.” members should follow their own rules.

**STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Relevance of Questions)**

In this second point of order the Government House Leader (Hon. Mr. Merriman) raised the issue that questions asked during question period relating to Saskatchewan Party political donations should be found out of order. To support his point of order, the Government House Leader quoted rule 20(2) which states:

Questions relating to any matter within the administrative competence of the government or on matters related to individual ministerial responsibility may be asked of a Minister of the Crown. Questions on issues not officially connected with the government, of a private nature, related to Board of Internal Economy, caucus, party, or political responsibilities are prohibited.

The Opposition House Leader (Mr. McCall) indicated that questions relating to electoral finance law are a matter of responsibility and competence for the Government of Saskatchewan and should be found in order.

I have considered the matter and reviewed the record. The exchange in question can be found on page 1125 of *Hansard* where the member asked a question about political funding and in turn a response was given relating to political campaign expenses. Everything the Opposition House Leader said is true but the problem is the member did not directly connect his question to electoral finance laws or any other matter within the government's responsibility. The previous day the member asked a similar question but on that occasion he did connect it to campaign finance laws.

I find that the question on Thursday was out of order. Members need to directly connect their question to the administration of the government in accordance with rule 20(2). I find that the point of order is well taken.

**STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Unparliamentary Language)**

The third point of order raised in the Assembly on November 3, 2016 was made by the Opposition House Leader (Mr. McCall). He stated "at the start of question period the Minister of the Economy, while the Premier was speaking, shouted over that, quote: 'That's an absolute lie.'" The Government House Leader (Hon. Mr. Merriman) responded that he did not think there was anything on the record and that he did not hear the comment.

When the Speaker must consult both the written and video record before a matter is addressed illustrates the difficulty caused by excessive noise and members shouting across the floor. It also prevents me from dealing promptly with questionable language.

I have reviewed the *Hansard* and listened to the video recording. I did not find, nor did I hear the comments alleged to have been said by the Minister. Accordingly, I am not able to rule on this particular instance. However, I would like to clarify that unparliamentary remarks are out of order whether they are on the record or not.

This is consistent with the ruling made by Speaker Kowalsky on April 11, 2007 when he stated:

I wish to conclude by cautioning all members to be temperate in their remarks, both while recognized to speak and while speaking from their seat. Many of these unofficial comments or heckles are intentionally provocative and inflammatory. The course of last Thursday's debate is illustrative of how such remarks are unhelpful. The fact *Hansard* may not be able to attribute them to a particular member does not make them acceptable language.

PRAYERS

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Unparliamentary Language)

I am prepared to rule on the points of order that were raised by the Government House Leader (Hon. Mr. Merriman) immediately after question period, on Tuesday, March 7, 2017. The Government House Leader raised three separate instances of unparliamentary language which he indicated were contrary to rule 47(2) and were used during question period by the Opposition Whip (Mr. Vermette), the Opposition House Leader (Mr. McCall) and the member for Saskatoon Nutana (Ms. Sproule). The Government House Leader while raising his point of order alleged that the Opposition Whip shouted “lies, lies, lies” from his seat.

He went on to state that the Opposition House Leader used the phrase “half-truths” and further that the Finance critic used “lies” in her questions. In response to the point of order, the Opposition House Leader encouraged a review of the record and asked that not just the words should be considered but also the manner in which the comments were made.

I have reviewed the record and I am now prepared to rule on this matter. With regard to the first instance, the Government House Leader alleged that the Opposition Whip shouted from his seat “lies, lies, lies.” I have carefully reviewed *Hansard*, taken into consideration that there is no other record of the member making these remarks and further I did not hear these remarks. It is on this basis I find that the point of order is not well taken. However, I would like to remind all members that hurling insults and accusations across the floor is contrary to proper conduct in this Assembly and can incite disorder.

In the second instance, the Government House Leader indicated that the Opposition House Leader used the phrase “half-truths.” On page 1568 of *Hansard* the member did state “they want the whole truth, not a half-truth.” On May 16, 2013, Speaker D’Autremont ruled the former member for Prince Albert Carlton out of order when he used the words half-truth. At the time, the Speaker cited the definition of half-truth as “a statement that mingles truth and falsehood with deliberate intent to deceive.” In this instance, the member was required to withdraw his remark and apologize. I find this point of order is well taken. At the end of my statement I ask that the Opposition House Leader withdraw the comment and apologize.

The final point of order relates to the use of the word “lies” by the opposition Finance critic, the member from Saskatoon Nutana. I have reviewed *Hansard* and on page 1568 there are two instances where the member used the phrases “the games, the lines, the spin” and “the lines that we keep hearing.” During the debate there was a lot of noise in the Assembly and it may have been difficult to discern the difference between the words “lies” and “lines.” However, after reviewing the record I find that the member from Saskatoon Nutana did use the word “lines.” I find the point of order not well taken.

In closing I would like to caution all members to temper their comments and use restraint when making comments across the floor as this interferes with the proper functioning of the Assembly. Members should be mindful of displaying proper decorum and adhering to the rules of debate. I am requesting that all members co-operate in toning down the banter as it does not add to effective parliamentary discourse.

Thereupon, the Opposition House Leader withdrew his remarks and apologized.

STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Early release of content of a bill—Prima Facie not established)

Today, March 13, 2017 at 11:40 a.m. the Opposition House Leader (Mr. McCall) gave notice that he proposed to raise a question of privilege in accordance with rule 12. I thank the member for providing notice. In his case he argued that the Minister for the Economy (Hon. Mr. Harrison) released content of Bill 47—An Act to Reduce Salaries of Members of the Legislative Assembly, 2017 to the media on March 9, 2017, the same day that he gave notice of first reading in this Assembly. The Opposition House Leader went further that the untimely release of confidential information by the Minister of the Economy constitutes a prima facie case of contempt of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan.

The Opposition House Leader points out that the media and the public were made aware of the content of the bill prior to members of this House and as such limited their abilities as legislators.

I would like to draw to the attention of the Assembly that the Opposition House Leader provided notice at 11:40 a.m. today. This notice was late as the rules state that at least two hours' notice is required prior to the regular daily sitting.

In the case presented by the Opposition House Leader, the Speaker is asked to deal with the early release of content of a bill and rule on this matter. The bill has not been introduced at this point so the Speaker has no way of knowing or ascertaining the content of the bill.

In making his case, the Opposition House Leader acknowledged uncertainty as to the content of the bill. Consequently, I find that a prima facie case on this question of privilege has not been established.

**STATEMENT BY THE SPEAKER
(Deferred Ruling)**

Earlier today the Government House Leader (Hon. Mr. Merriman) raised a question of privilege under the provisions of rule 12 of *The Rules and Procedures of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan*. Upon receipt of this notice, in accordance with the rules, both House Leaders were informed of the details of the case and the proposed question of privilege.

It is the responsibility of the Speaker to determine if a prima facie case of privilege has been established. Contempt of the Assembly is a serious charge, which requires careful examination of the case and this Assembly's practices and precedents. I wish to inform the Assembly that I have not had sufficient time to reach a decision on this question, so for this reason I shall defer my ruling.

Members are not to discuss or debate the matter of a possibility of leaked information. This is a very serious charge that I do not take lightly. I ask all members to heighten the decorum in this Assembly. We should have vigorous debate in this Assembly on ideas and policies, but we should not debate the character of honourable members from both sides of the Assembly. Today, in question period, I will have zero patience for any members that challenge the principles that this Assembly has been built on.

Her Honour The Lieutenant Governor, having entered the Chamber, took her seat upon the Throne. Her Honour was then pleased to deliver the following speech:

Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislative Assembly, people of Saskatchewan.

The Speech from the Throne that opened the twenty-eighth legislature presented a plan to keep Saskatchewan strong and reaffirm my government's commitment to continued growth and prosperity for all in Saskatchewan.

Since the first session of the twenty-eighth legislature began, our province has faced a significant challenge with respect to non-renewable resource prices. Since 2014, the revenues received from our province's resource sector have declined by \$1.3 billion. In this session, my government chose to meet this challenge head-on.

While some other governments have chosen to continue running deficits indefinitely, my government chose to take a different approach. To secure Saskatchewan's future, difficult decisions had to be made to ensure economic growth and reduce the province's dependence on resource revenues while ensuring important services and programs are sustainable in the long run.

My government set a goal to return the budget to balance in three years and we are on track to meet that commitment.

My government remains committed to creating an environment that fosters innovation, attracts investment and people and encourages growth.

As a result of this budget, Saskatchewan individuals and families will pay among the lowest income taxes in Canada—ranging from the lowest to the third-lowest for most, depending on level of income. When the tax changes announced in this budget are fully implemented, Saskatchewan will have the lowest taxes on manufacturing and processing, and nation-leading research and development incentives, giving our province a tremendous advantage in attracting new investment, jobs, and opportunities to Saskatchewan.

Over the past decade my government has made record infrastructure investments. My government has invested \$26 billion to repair and replace schools, rebuild our hospitals, fix our highways, and upgrade and expand our electrical grids.

This fall, Saskatchewan's largest education capital project was completed on time and on budget. Students in our fastest growing communities of Regina, Saskatoon, Warman, and Martensville have started this school year in 18 brand new schools. Work continues on the Jim Pattison Children's Hospital, the Saskatchewan Hospital North Battleford and on the Regina bypass—the largest infrastructure project in the history of Saskatchewan.

During this session, my government reaffirmed our commitment to keep Saskatchewan strong, fulfilling promises we made in 2016 by:

- Allowing employees more time to care for loved ones and family members by extending compassionate care leave from eight weeks to 28 weeks;
- Providing Saskatchewan people the option to privately pay for a CT scan;
- Fulfilling our commitment to increase funding for the Canadian National Institute for the Blind and provide post vision loss rehabilitation therapy; and
- Providing better healthcare services in the north by expanding remote presence medical technology to additional communities in the northern Saskatchewan.

Furthermore, my government passed legislative and regulatory changes to improve public safety, provide better services, protect the most vulnerable and strengthen Saskatchewan through:

- *The Provincial Health Authority Act*, which creates one health authority to better coordinate and streamline health services across the province and reduce administrative costs;
- *The Traffic Safety Amendment Act*, which combats impaired driving through tougher penalties for impaired driving;
- Further amendments to *The Traffic Safety Amendment Act* including blue lights on tow trucks to increase tow truck visibility on highways and making our highways safer for roadside assistance workers;
- *The Victims of Interpersonal Violence Amendment Act*, which provides greater protection to victims of domestic violence by allowing them to end rental leases early if necessary to remove themselves from an unsafe situation;

- *The Pipelines Amendment Act*, which strengthens regulatory requirements for pipelines to improve pipeline safety;
- *The Saskatchewan Commercial Innovation Incentive Act*, which encourages investment through the creation of the first “patent box” incentive in North America;
- *The Workers’ Compensation Amendment Act*, which establishes a rebuttal presumption for all forms of psychological injury; and
- *The Adoption Amendment Act*, which strengthens *The Adoption Act* to better serve families, provide improved protection to children and enhance child welfare.

These are just few of the many changes my government has implemented to improve the quality of life for Saskatchewan people and secure future growth in the province.

Members of the Legislative Assembly, it is my duty to discharge you from further attendance of the first session of the twenty-eighth legislature. In closing, I wish to thank all members of the assembly for your hard work and the commitment you have shown to your duties in this chamber and to your constituents.

As of December 30, all amine solutions require the removal of contaminants and the parts of the solution that have broken down and become ineffective. The most significant maintenance for the SO₂ amine at BD3 is related to fly-ash contamination. Currently, the replacement of the SO₂ amine is more cost effective than treatment, and so treatment has been stopped. Replacement of the SO₂ amine compares favourably with the cost to purchase limestone, which would be a more traditional SO₂ treatment option. The CO₂ amine's most significant maintenance requirements are related to degradation. Treating the CO₂ amine is more cost effective than replacement, and the CO₂ amine has never been replaced. New CO₂ amine must be added to make up for the amine lost to degradation.

A mutually agreed upon alternative has been reached between the WCB and the Information and Privacy Commissioner. The alternative would see amendments to *The Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act* to ensure that the provisions of the information and privacy legislation apply to *The Workers’ Compensation Act, 2013*. This will enable workers to access their information while ensuring that their health information in the possession of the WCB is considered personal information and therefore maintained in confidence. Given this agreement, no further consultation will be undertaken on this recommendation.

The policy changes are in development and will be applicable to the 2017 fiscal year.

Answer:

The criteria used as the basis for inclusive funding are addressing individual child needs, equity among childcare centres in allocation of funds, and public accountability. Centres were not consulted in this decision given that only 3% of childcare centres or 10 centres were receiving funding through the centre inclusion block funding. If those centres that previously received centre inclusion block funding still have children with additional needs, they can make application for funding for eligible children.

Question no. 420 (Mr. Meili):

To the Minister Responsible for SaskBuilds, for the Regina bypass project, what is the total value of contract(s) with Associated Engineering Group Limited?

Answer:

SaskBuilds has no contracts with Associated Engineering Group Limited.

Answer:

- (a) Current open education resources initiatives underway at the University of Saskatchewan, University of Regina, and Saskatchewan Polytechnic have the potential to save students nearly \$700,000 annually.

- (b) Since inception, a total of \$250K in grants has been provided annually to the University of Regina, University of Saskatchewan, and Saskatchewan Polytechnic to encourage the development of open educational resources.
- (c) Subject to budget appropriation, additional grants will be provided in 2017–18 to support development of open education resources. The grants provided by government are the result of a 2014 memorandum of understanding (MOU) signed by Saskatchewan, Alberta, and British Columbia. The agreement is currently being evaluated to determine potential next steps. While the three-year MOU has expired, the collaboration between provinces continues, and BC is the lead on the evaluation.
